First Declension	Feminine ending (-a)
Second Declension	Masculine ending (-us)

Case Endings

Nominative Case	Noun that is the subject of a sentence
Accusative Case	Noun that is the direct object of a sentence

First Declension Number

Case	Singular	Plural
Nominative	puella	puellae
Accusative	puellam	puellas

Second Declension Number

Case	Singular	Plural
Nominative	equus	equi
Accusative	equum	equos

First Conjugation (-a stem verbs)

	Singular	Personal Endings
First Person	laudo	I praise -o
Second Person	laudas	you praise -s
Third Person	laudat	he, she, it praises -t

Plural

First Person	lauda-mus	we praise -mus
Second Person	laudatis	you praise -tis
Third Person	laudant	they praise -nt

Can be translated as "I praise", "I am praising" or "I do praise".

Second Conjugation (-e stem verbs)

	Singular	Personal Endings
First Person	video	I see -o
Second Person	vides	you see -s
Third Person	videt	he, she, it sees -t

Plural

First Person	videmus	we see -mus
Second Person	videtis	you see -tis
Third Person**	vident	they see -nt

Can be translated as "I see", "I am seeing" or "I do see".

Irregular Verbs

	Singular	Plural
sum	I am	sumus we are
es	you are	estis you are
est	he, she, it is	sunt they are

Based on esse - to be

Irregular Verbs 2

	Singular	Plural
possum	I am able	possumus we are able
potes	you are able	potestis you are able
potest	he, she, it is able	possunt they are able

Based on posse - to be able.
