

	<p>Past Perfect (simple): (cont)</p> <p>Positive: You had studied Spanish before you went to Madrid.</p> <p>Question: Had you studied Spanish before you went to Madrid?</p> <p>Negative: You hadn't studied Spanish before you went to Madrid.</p>	<p>Present simple: (cont)</p> <p>Question: Do you like Edinburgh?</p> <p>Negative: You do not like Edinburgh.</p> <p>In regular verbs, this tense is formed by using the verb stem, adding -s in the third person singular (he, she, it).</p>	<p>Present Perfect Continuous:</p> <p>Actions which started in the past and continue now (action verbs), recent continuous actions</p> <p>Positive: You have been standing here for two hours.</p> <p>Question: Have you been standing here for two hours?</p> <p>Negative: You have not been standing here for two hours.</p>
<p>Simple</p> <p>Completed actions, routines or habits, give us information, or makes predictions</p>	<p>Past continuous/ Past progressive:</p> <p>Actions in progress at a particular time in the past, actions interrupted in the past, two actions happening simultaneously in the past</p> <p>Form: was/were + verb + -ing</p> <p>e.g. 'What were you doing at 10.00 last night?', 'I was writing letters'</p>	<p>Present Perfect Tense</p> <p>Past actions that are related to or continue into the present.</p> <p>Formed by combining the present tense of the verb have with the past participle of the main verb.</p> <p>Positive: You have visited the Prado Museum before.</p> <p>Question: Have you visited the Prado Museum before?</p> <p>Negative: You have not visited the Prado Museum before.</p>	<p>Future</p>
<p>Perfect</p> <p>Earlier actions followed by later actions or even earlier actions!</p>	<p>Past Perfect Continuous:</p> <p>an action in progress in the past leading up to another past moment</p> <p>Form: had + been + verb + -ing</p> <p>e.g. 'He had been cleaning the car for an hour before he stopped because of the rain'</p>	<p>Present continuous/ Present progressive:</p> <p>Happening now or around now</p> <p>Form: am/is/are + verb + -ing</p> <p>Positive: You are watching TV.</p> <p>Question: Are you watching TV?</p> <p>Negative: You are not watching TV.</p>	<p>Future Perfect:</p> <p>an action that will have already happened before a specific point in the future</p> <p>Form: will + have + past participle e.g. 'I'll have already left by the time you arrive'</p>
<p>Continuous</p> <p>Actions that continue over time or happening simultaneously in the past</p>	<p>Present</p>		<p>Future Continuous/ Future Progressive:</p> <p>An action in progress at a particular time in the future</p> <p>Form: will + be + verb + -ing</p> <p>Positive: You'll be cooking dinner when they arrive.</p> <p>Question: Will you be cooking dinner when they arrive?</p> <p>Negative: You won't be cooking dinner when they arrive</p>
<p>Perfect Continuous</p> <p>show duration, completion, and importance</p>	<p>Present simple:</p> <p>Routine/habitual actions or things which are generally true</p> <p>Positive: You like Edinburgh.</p>		
<p>Past</p>			
<p>Past simple:</p> <p>Completed, finished actions with a specific time reference</p> <p>Showing whether an action or condition occurred</p> <p>Positive: You played tennis.</p> <p>Question: Did you play tennis?</p> <p>Negative: You didn't play tennis.</p>			
<p>Past Perfect (simple):</p> <p>When we're already talking about the past but want to refer to an earlier past time</p> <p>Form: had + past participle</p> <p>e.g. 'I couldn't get in because I had forgotten my keys'</p>			



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Future Perfect Continuous:

An action that will continue up until a certain future point
Form: will + have + been + verb + -ing
Positive: You'll be cooking dinner when they arrive.
Question: Will you be cooking dinner when they arrive?
Negative: You won't be cooking dinner when they arrive.

Future Simple Tense

Describes what will happen for predictions and future projects
Often called the going to future, this form is a combination of be + going to + verb stem
Positive: You are going to see the show tonight.
Question: Are you going to see the show tonight?
Negative: You are not going to see the show tonight.



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
