Feedback Definition

According to the Wbstern's Dictionary, FEEDBACK is the transmission of evaluative or corrective information about an action, event, or process to the original or controlling source, in this case, from teacher to student in a class.

FEEDBACK



Providing feedback to students in a positive way, even when they make mistakes; correcting their mistakes indirectly, for example, repeating his/her answer not as a correction, but as a good answer saying it right.

Negative feedback



Negative feedback could make the students feel uncomfortable and limit their confidence for further participation.

Cheering the student highlighting the good points of his/her production and comment on it.

Letting the student give his/her complete answer and then "correcting" the sentences using the right words or providing other options to give the same idea.

Motivate students giving them positive remarks about their ideas.



Provide constructive comments in a positive way.

Efficient and Inefficient Feedback

Telling short positive interjections: "Yea!", "Ok, great!", "Cool!" "Very good!"	Negative feedback: Telling how wrong the student is with his/her answer.
