Meh. What's on your mind?

Ending the Conversation and Responses

It was a pleasure talking to you.

mine.

I enjoyed our conversation /

(It was) my pleasure.

talking to you.

Same here.

I'll see you tomorrow / next week / after

school.

I'll see you then.

Good-bye.

Bye.

See you around / later / then.

Sure thing.

I'll see you when I see you.

Yup!

See you / See ya'!

Well Wishes

Have a nice day / pleasant evening / safe trip / good weekend.

Enjoy your flight / stay / tour.

Good luck to you.

Responses to Well Wishes

Thank you. You, too. Thank you. I will.

Same to you. Likewise.

Openers

Excuse me, is this seat taken?

Sorry to bother you, but do you have the time?

Would you happen to know if there's a cafe / bank / grocery store

near here?

Nice / beautiful day, isn't it?

This is a great hotel / park / party, isn't it?

I can't believe how busy this store / airport is today!

Hey, I love your shirt / hat / dog!

Hi! I don't think we've met.

Hi, I didn't catch your name...

Indirect openers test to see if a person is interested in talking.

Direct openers start conversation in a friendly and open way.

Self Introduction

May I introduce myself?

Let / Allow me to introduce myself.

By the way, I'm ~

Remember to shake hands!

Ice Breakers - Reason for Visiting

Is this your first time to **[Tokyo]**?

Have you been to [Japan] before?

Are you here on business?

Have you seen much of the city / country?

How long have you been here?

How long are you planning to stay?

How do you like it here so far?

"YES or NO Questions" are a good way to start polite conversation.

Ice Breakers - Personal Information

Where are you from?

What part of [country] do you live in?

Are you traveling alone or with family / friends?

Do you like music / theater / art / sports ?

What do you do for a living?

What kind of business are you in?

Before a *personal question*, it is polite to say:

"If you don't mind me asking..."

"If I may I ask..."
