




### Finite clauses

A **finite clause** includes a primary verb — a verb that can be inflected for tense, person and sometimes number — and includes a subject.




### Synchronic vs Diachronic linguistics

**Synchronic linguistics** is the study of language at a particular point in time.

**Diachronic linguistics** is the study of the history or evolution of language.

### Corporous linguistics

**Corpus linguistics** - a methodology that involves computer-based empirical analyses (both quantitative and qualitative) of language use by employing large, electronically available collections of naturally occurring spoken and written texts, so-called corpora.

### Bottom-up vs Top-down processes

**Bottom-up processing** is *data-driven* *riven*, and your perception of what it is that you're looking at directs your cognitive awareness of the object.

**Top-down processing** basically uses your *background knowledge*, so uses your background knowledge to influence perception.

### Nominative & Accusative pronouns

**Nominative case** is the case used for a noun or pronoun which is the subject of a verb.

**Accusative case** is the case used for a noun or pronoun which is the object of a sentence.

Third Person	he, she, it	they
<b>Objective Case</b>		
First Person	me	us
Second Person	you	you
Third Person	him, her, it	them
<b>Possessive Case</b>		
First Person	my, mine	our, ours
Second Person	your, yours	your, yours
Third Person	his, her, hers, its	their, theirs



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
