

First Declension - "-a, -ae"

Usually for feminine nouns, but can apply to some masculine occupations. e.g. poēta, poētae m. ('poet'), agricola, agricolae m. ('farmer'), auriga, aurigae m. ('auriga, charioteer'), pīrāta, pīrātae m. ('pirate') and nauta, nautae m. ('sailor').

Second Declension - "-us, -ī or -um, ī"

The Third Declension contains the largest grouping of nouns. Includes masculine, feminine, and neuter nouns. The Stem is found in the genitive singular form after breaking off the ending "-is".



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
